

CONFERENCE DINNER

The Conference Dinner will take place in the magnificent Bendigo Town Hall. Its stunning interior reflects the story of the 'gold age' of Bendigo with gold leaf, decorative plaster, murals and soaring ceilings. The dinner will be seated with a dress code of smart casual. Local cover duo 'Slide' will play current and classic hits for guests to hit the dance floor after dinner.

CLIMATE + DRESS CODE

The average temperature in late June around 14 degrees with overnight temperatures as low as 0 degrees. There may be rain and cold wind. Morning frost is a common occurrence, depending on the cloud cover with frosty mornings followed by clear sunny days. Students should wear warm clothing and comfortable shoes and socks. A warm coat or jacket is highly recommended, along with a scarf and gloves for outdoor activities.

ACCOMMODATION

Students will be accommodated in twin, triple or family rooms depending on the requirements of each delegation. Several suitable motels have been booked for the conference and allocations will be made as registrations are received. The cost of accommodation is included in the registration with an option to opt out if a school needs to make separate arrangements. (Please note that transport to and from conference activities and events can only be provided to the motels arranged by the conference.)

TRANSPORTATION

Delegates arriving at Bendigo Railway Station (including those travelling on the Airport Bus Service from Melbourne) and Bendigo Airport will be collected and transported to their accommodation.

Schools are asked to send a copy of their itinerary to the conference once finalised.

During the conference, delegates will be transported to all conference events and activities by bus.

CONFERENCE HOSTS

Bendigo

Catherine McAuley College Bendigo is a co-educational secondary school, established in 1876 by the Sisters of Mercy and now



set on two magnificent campuses. Students in Years 7 to 9 are located in a natural bush setting at our Coolock Campus at Junortoun on the eastern fringe of the Bendigo, while our Years 10 to 12 students are at St Mary's near the city centre. The Mercy Junortoun Sporting Precinct at the Coolock Campus will be the setting for the 2024 AMSSA Conference.

CONFERENCE PROGRAM

Explore how young people who are passionate about social and environmental justice can make a difference in the community in the spirit of Mercy.

Discover the rich history of Bendigo's goldfields by descending 61 metres below the surface to walk in the footsteps of past miners.

Travel through time and the streets of Bendigo on the Dja Dja Wurrung Tram Tour as members of the Dja Dja Wurrung clan share the history of the region's first people through stories and song.

Celebrate Mass together in the magnificent Sacred Heart Cathedral. The Cathedral, which was constructed in 1897, is the third largest church in Australia and second tallest after St Patrick's Cathedral in Melbourne.

Develop friendships and deepen connections during the Conference Dinner at the stunning Bendigo Town Hall. Be stirred by an inspirational speaker before hitting the dance floor for a fun night out.

Hear good news stories from Mercy Works and hear how their work is improving the lives of vulnerable communities.

Find moments of peace and reflection at the Great Stupa of Universal Compassion, the largest stupa in the Western World. Learn about interfaith harmony and the fundamentals of Buddhism.

Reconnect with nature and deepen ecological identity, spirituality and action with Juliet Talarico.

PRESENTERS

Mercy Works

Mercy Works is the development arm of the Sisters of Mercy in Australia and Papua New Guinea. The organisation works in partnership with vulnerable communities and local organisations domestically and in the Asia Pacific region to build capacity, dignity and self-reliance.

Young Mercy Links is an inclusive group of young people with a spirit of Mercy and a passion for social and community justice. They are involved in justice and advocacy in areas such as sustainability, women and poverty, and people seeking asylum.

Juliet Talarico is passionate about environmental education and ecology. She is committed to empowering young people to address the challenges of Earth degradation.

STUDENT CONTRIBUTION

Students will be asked to bring a candle to represent their school at the Conference Mass (size to be travelfriendly). One candle for each school.

Each school will be asked to supply a poster to show where they are from and to share their Mercy story. Details will be forwarded to schools after registrations are received.

MEALS

Conference fees will include breakfast, lunch, dinner and snacks on Tuesday and Wednesday. Thursday will include breakfast and morning tea.

Meals throughout the conference will be communal and enjoyed in a variety of locations. Delegates will be transported to the conference venue for shared breakfasts rather than eating at the motels, to maximise opportunities for social interaction.

Delegates will be asked to notify the conference of any dietary requirements when registering. For specific concerns, contact the organisers directly to ensure needs are met. Students should bring a water bottle for use during the conference. Drink bottles are easily refilled at any of our water stations throughout the conference venue. Bendigo tap water is fine to drink.

PRE-CONFERENCE DINNER

Those who arrive in Bendigo throughout the day on Monday 24 June are invited to enjoy a relaxed evening at the conference venue getting to know each other and sharing dinner of pizza. This is an optional activity and an additional charge of \$20 per person will be incurred to cover cost of the meal and transport to the venue.


